Contesting is a great way to sharpen up your skills for Field Day. It is also a real world way to test your equipment. We mention the ARRL November Sweepstakes in a separate article in this issue. The "Sweeps" offer an excellent opportunity to achieve a WAS (Worked All States) award. So stay warm this winter and do some contesting; we guarantee you won't regret it.




CARS members enjoyed an excellent dinner at Simon's in Brecksville at the October dinner meeting.

**Non-certified Radios
Dave, AC8TN**



The above FCC Public Notice issued 24/SEPT/18 may be of interest to WO readers. I'm writing this short article to summarize this document.

The FCC has become aware of retailers selling non-certified low cost two-way VHF/UHF radio that do not comply with FCC rules and therefore are not authorized to be imported, advertised, sold or operated in the USA. The issue with this “typically” imported gear, is that it can be modified to transmit on public safety and other land mobile channels for which it is not authorized and or are capable of wideband operations (i.e. >12.5kHz). Such radios are illegal.

Anyone importing, advertising or selling such noncompliant devices should stop immediately, and anyone owning such devices should not use them. Violators may be subject to substantial monetary penalties up to \$19,639 per day of marketing violations and up to \$147,290 for an ongoing violation.

Amateur Radio exception: “there is one exception to this certification requirement: if a device is capable of operating only on frequencies that the FCC has allocated for use by the Amateur Radio Services licensees, it does not require FCC equipment authorization, and an amateur licensee may use his or her license to operate such radios. However, many two-way radios that purport to operate on amateur frequencies also operate on frequencies that extend beyond the designated amateur frequency bands. If a two-way VHF/UHF radio is capable of operating outside of the amateur frequency bands, it cannot be imported, advertised, sold or operated within the USA without an FCC equipment certification.

What you should do prior to purchase is ensure that a device is either labeled as FCC-compliant or operates solely within amateur frequencies. If you already own this illegal gear stop using it.

Notes from the Tech Committee

Hi gang. There is not much to report from the Tech Committee, although there were some improvements made to the repeater. This past Sunday, Vince, N8OVW, and Bob, K8MD, installed some new hardware that Vince had been waiting quite a while for. This included a proper isolator and four critical length sections of feedline. All the cans were arranged properly in the racks, and things tuned better than they were with the makeshift arrangement we had. Many thanks to Vince and Bob for their expertise. Both are indispensable resources.

Many of you might not realize that we are sharing TX/RX antennas with other services that use the tower. This creates problems achieving proper isolation from other receivers and transmitters using the same antennas. Most clubs only have to deal with keeping their own equipment happy, not having to make it play nice with other services using the same antennas. Designing such systems can be expensive, the hardware is not cheap, and we are very lucky to have someone like Vince, and now Bob who understand these RF environments, and have connections for hardware and services most guys do not.

We did lose some on the UHF transmit side, but we will be getting a better amplifier on line, as we now have one available.

Just a reminder, the Tech Committee, is here for the purpose of problem solving, and we encourage the membership to take advantage of the knowledge pool in the committee. It is pretty deep in my estimation.

Member Profile

Joe Ulaszewski, KD8BAL

How did you become interested in ham radio?

I believe my interest in amateur radio started when I was around eight or nine years old, when I got my first transistor radio. This radio opened my awareness to the happenings around the United States, especially at night, when more distant cities came in loud and clear. I was amazed at the selection of programs available. One could listen to distant ball games, talk shows or interviews, any type of music and of course all of the many radio preachers telling me I'm going to hell with all of the fire and brimstone they could muster.

Local radio was also interesting. We had three rock and roll stations with a plethora of radio dj's and personalities. At night at 10 o'clock on KYW, there was a program similar to "Coast to Coast." I don't remember the host's name, but once a month, an authority on UFOs would be on. Needless to say, there were some mornings I had a hard time getting up.

This love of radio lead me to purchase a shortwave radio when I was fifteen years old. With a dipole in my attic, the presence of world communication opened up to me, including amateur radio. The shortwave radio was a Hallicrafters S-108. I spent many an hour listening to this radio.

What made you decide to take the test? When did you get your license(s)?

In my sophomore year, I found out one of the Physics teachers started an amateur radio club. With him, I studied the theory for a novice license, and practiced code with a surplus army code machine which used a paper tape with dits and dahs marked on the tape. I took the code and theory tests in February of '66 and passed them both. The novice license at that time was only good for a year. The next step was either a technician license or a general license. To my regret, I became more interested in cars and girls and let my license lapse.

What are your base station radios and antennas?

My interest in amateur radio awoke again in 2004, and by 2007, I had acquired my extra license. With the help of many CARS' elmers, I got my home station up and running. My equipment includes; a GAP Titan 6 to 80 meter antenna atop a 20' high pole, a 2 meter and 70 cm "J" pole, a Yaesu FT 897 HF/VHF/UHF all mode transceiver with tuner, a Yaesu FT 2800M FM transceiver, a 12 V power supply and an Icom T90A 3 band HT. I hope in the next year I will acquire a digital radio. My ham shack is nothing but a desk countertop for now, but I hope by next summer, my will resemble a roomy and recognizable shack in my basement.

What are your favorite on air activities?

For now, I enjoy contesting, field day with the club, skywarn and our weekly net. I hope to get into EME and satellite communication, serious DXing and code in the future.

November Sweeps Toby, WT8O

Coming up this month is my favorite contest besides Field Day, the ARRL November Sweepstakes. There are two separate contests held two weeks apart. The first one is CW only, held on the 3rd and 4th, and the second is SSB only, held on the 17th and 18th. The object is to contact as many US and Canadian sections as possible. Working all 83 sections is called a "Clean Sweep." The contest runs for 30 hours, but each station can only work a total of 24 hours.

A while back, we talked about entering the contest as a club. Any individual operator can work from home and submit his score as a Local Club member. That means we can total all our scores together and compete with other clubs. Even if you only have a few contacts, they would help the club total. There is no minimum number of contacts needed per individual or maximum number of individuals participating per club. This is a perfect example of a true team effort.

I remember my first "Sweeps." What a trip! I didn't have a computerized logging program, I did it all with a pencil and index cards. I was just going to try out my new General ticket, my new 746 Pro and my new dipole to see if I could get a few contacts. Thirty hours and sixty-two sections later, my head was pounding, my bloodshot eyes were watering like Niagara, the ice pack on my neck was leaking lukewarm water down my rigidly stiff back and I was only regretting the whole thing was over. The adrenaline rush was unforgettable.
